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



John Gill and Scott Aquino, also local coaches in our area, won the Open Men's Doubles, and Bill Spradley and David Anderson won the over-60s Men's doubles. Another Seal Beach local medal winner was Chris Cali, a Bronze medalist in the open Men's Doubles. Chris runs the 'Sorry Not Sorry' Pickleball podcast.

The semifinals and finals of the Open Men's doubles can be seen on the John Gill Pickleball YouTube channel.

Pickleball is a fun sport that offers physical exercise, mental exercise, and a likely mental health boost. It is played by hitting a hollow plastic wiffleball punctuated by holes with a hard-surfaced paddle over a short net on a badminton-sized court.

They were invented in 1965 on Bainbridge Island, Seattle, by Barney McCullum, Bill Bell, and Joel Prichard. They named it after the local Pickle boat races that used hybrid crews. Pickleball is a Tennis and Ping Pong hybrid on a badminton-sized court. It provides mental and physical exercise as well as fun with friends. It can be played outdoors or indoors by all ages.

Here are some of the benefits of playing Pickleball:

Physical Exercise: Pickleball offers highintensity interval training (HIIT), which is an efficient way to get the benefits of aerobic exercise in a short time. It can offer some of the benefits of tennis but on a smaller scale. There is evolutionary evidence for the benefits of physical activity, particularly in middle age and above.


original music and dance performed to the backdrop of the student-reproduced, aweinspiring artwork. This year's pageant will be on display March 8th and 9th.



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



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SURFSIDE SUNSET BEACH SAVE THE SAND

Starting in the 1930s, the coastline of Orange County, California, between Anaheim Bay (where the Navy ships come in) and Newport Beach, began to erode. After constructing the jetties at Anaheim Bay in 1942, the shoreline at Surfside and Sunset Beach began to seriously erode, and many lost homes due to storms. Beach nourishments (sand replenishment) were begun at Surfside in 1945 and were continued through the next decade to help alleviate the problem. In the late 1950s, it became apparent that a planned, permanent solution was required to bring stability and protection to the seventeen miles of Orange County coastline.

The severe erosion was a direct result of construction performed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) trying to harness and control the rivers in Southern California. The USACE managed the development of the entire region, the construction of protective breakwaters allowing for the creation of the Los Angeles/ Long Beach Harbor and the construction of jetties at Anaheim Bay which created an entrance to the Seal Beach Naval Weapons Station. These projects were provided for the benefit of the State of California and the Federal Government.

The Surfside Sunset Beach Project was then initiated and the USACE was designated as the provider.



Importantly, because the beach destruction was caused entirely by government action, this program was designated as "unique" among all nourishment projects and was granted precedence. The State of California and the federal government were the sole beneficiaries of the original construction projects, which disrupted the natural beach restoration process. For this stage, in written agreement, the State of California, the primary beneficiary of the coastal damaging projects, has also requested the other communities, the aggrieved communities, and the damaged communities to shoulder more responsibility. As it has always existed since inception, the coastal restoration project has







provided 100% of the benefits to the State of California for 30% of the total project funding cost. The various communities are not equal partners in this project. The federal government and the state were determined to have been the cause of the erosion problem. For the 1st twelve phases of sand replenishment, the federal government and state accepted the responsibility and provided the temporary sand replenishment solution. The other local communities have participated as initially required. Phase 13 started in December 2023,and concluded at the end of last month (February).

This sand nourishment project, that was studied, designed, and directed by public law in 1962 and effectively succeeded in protecting the California coastline for over forty years, was unilaterally altered by the USACE in 1995 and mostly abandoned in 2012. Locals voiced their concerns and it took over 10 years to get the much needed sand replenishment back on track. In early September 2023, the USACE informed the residents that they had received only one bid in response to the sand replenishment request to perform the 13th phase of the Surfside Sunset Project. That bid was from Manson Construction Inc. for \$25 million. Unfortunately, the bid was deemed too high and unacceptable. Phase 13 was reduced by about 35% and only 1,100,000 cubic yards of sand was replenished instead of the needed 1,700,000 cubic yards.

The Surfside and Sunset Beach residents are imploring the USACE and the State of California to provide more and ongoing nourishment to protect our neighbors just to the south. To help or get more info on this ongoing project, email taxdist@aol.com Attn: John Kriss
